Will you be my Valentine?

Do you remember giving out those little Valentine's Day cards to your classmates in elementary school? And how special did you feel when someone gave you a box of those sugar candies in the shape of a heart with loving sentiments imprinted on them? When you began to date in high school or college you continued the practice by giving nicer cards to your girlfriend or boyfriend along with a delightful box of chocolates from See's Candy (my favorite), Russell Stover or Lindt. When you got really serious about your girl, forget the chocolate... show her how much you really care... go to Jared's. And of course, don't forget the heart-decorated card.

I don't have anything against the display of affection through giving cards and candy, especially when Marty shares her chocolate covered strawberries with me. But the question "Will You Be My Valentine" which appears on every Valentine's Day card gives me pause as I consider the sweetness of God's love which is reflected in the life of St. Valentine.

History doesn't tell us much about the life St. Valentine except that 1) he actually existed sometime in the 3rd century A.D., 2) he was most likely a bishop or pastor, and 3) he was martyred for his faith in Christ. Accounts vary regarding his activities and because there was little to substantiate those accounts in 1969 the Roman Catholic Church removed St. Valentine from the General Roman Calendar, However, the church still recognizes him as a saint, listing him in the February 14 spot of Roman Martyrology.

One of the variations of the legend of St. Valentine records that he refused to sacrifice to pagan gods, was imprisoned and while imprisoned he healed the jailer's blind daughter. On the day of his execution, he left the girl a note signed, "Your Valentine." Not having the kind of historical credulity I would like to have, I still don't object to this annual observance because it reminds me of many other faithful Christians throughout the Christian era who have suffered martyrdom for refusing to renounce their faith in Jesus Christ. And I am always surprised that the death penalty is still exercised in parts of our world for simply proclaiming "I am a Christian." Not many of us have that kind of faith!

But back to my initial thought regarding the sentiment, "Will you be my Valentine?" If you ask someone that question outside your immediate family you'd probably get the response, "You've got to be kidding!" St Paul understood this as he wrote to the church in Rome:

"For one will scarcely die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die..." (Romans 5:7). He's got that right! But then he follows up that thought with verse 8: "but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us."

Maybe I'm overthinking this, but when you send that little card seeking the affection of another, asking to be Your Valentine, are you not asking, "Will you die for me?" Really, I know I'm pushing this farther than most of want to think about, but understanding Valentine's example, the question, "will you be my Valentine?" evokes soberness and somberness, not sentimentality. Dying for someone is a serious matter, a matter upon which God was willing to act! He sent His One and only Son, Jesus, who gave His life to redeem not just a special loved one, but for all people, saint and sinner alike. Jesus, as God's unique Son,

was the only person who could personally deliver God's love

so extensively and so completely.

So while you're writing your notes of endearment to each other on Valentine's Day, consider writing one more Valentine card to Jesus. Remember that when we ask God, "Will You be my Valentine?" His response comes not from a heart-shaped card and candy, but from a cross, soaked in His precious blood, an expression far more affectionate than we could ever imagine and far sweeter than any box of chocolates.



God in Man Made Manifest

The season of Epiphany focuses on how God was made manifest in the flesh of Jesus. The church spends time hearing of the miracles, signs, and wonders of Jesus in the world. And this made plain to all that Jesus really is who He said He was. He is the Second Person of the Holy Trinity, the only STEWARDSHIP begotten Son of the Father, in the flesh. For "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14).

> It is revealed for all the world to see that Jesus is God in the flesh. It is made manifest by His words and His work, by what He said and by what He did.

And these belong together, for "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us." Jesus is the Word and will of God in the flesh, that is, He is the walking, talking enactment of God's Word.

It is no different for us. We are called not just to believe in God in hearts but also to trust in God in word and deed. As James wrote: "But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves" (James 1:22), and again, "What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? ... So

also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead. ... Show me your faith apart from your works, and I will show you my faith by my works. ... For as the body apart from the spirit is dead, so also faith apart from works is dead" (James 2:14, 17-18, 26).

Our faith is lived out in works for our neighbor. Our trust in the Word and will of God is lived out not in word only but also in deed and in truth. In other words, the Epiphany of the Lord creates in us an epiphany of our faith in our works of obedience to God who commanded them. By this, our faith is made manifest to the world. It is, as Luther wrote of faith:

Faith is a divine work in us. It changes us and makes us to be born anew of God (John 1). It kills the old Adam and makes altogether different people, in heart and spirit and mind and powers, and it brings with it the Holy Spirit.

Oh, it is a living, busy, active, mighty thing, this faith. And so it is impossible for it not to do good works incessantly. It does not ask whether there are good works to do, but before the question rises, it has already done them, and is always at the doing of them.

He who does not these works is a faithless man. He gropes and looks about after faith and good works and knows neither what faith is nor what good works are, though he talks and talks, with many words about faith and good works.

Faith is a living, daring confidence in God's grace, so sure and certain that a man would stake his life on it a thousand times. This confidence in God's grace and knowledge of it makes men glad and bold and happy in dealing with God and all His creatures. And this is the work of the Holy Spirit in faith. Hence a man is ready and glad, without compulsion, to do good to everyone, to serve everyone, to suffer everything, in love and praise to God, who has shown him this grace.

And thus it is impossible to separate works from faith, quite as impossible as to separate burning and shining from fire. Beware, therefore, of your own false notions and of the idle talkers, who would be wise enough to make decisions about faith and good works, and yet are the greatest fools. (Preface to the Book of Romans)

So, then, let our faith be active by God's power in the Word through the Holy Spirit. And let then our faith be made manifest to the world by what this faith does: serving our neighbor - in church, in the family, and society – with the works of faith in time, talents, and treasures.



Youth - Pastor Vern Combining functions with Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Collinsville


<u>Old Business</u> – Chairman Curtis Kuppler Reported that there were approximately 30 people at the NOV Voters meeting
