

The Annual Church Picnic follows Rally Day



Today is not a good day! Oh it's actually a balmy 73 degrees and I'm watching the wind blow a gentle breeze keeping the trees outside my window in constant motion. So what makes it a bad day? I can sum it up in a word: CoVid-19! So from a meteorological standpoint it's a GREAT day. Unfortunately, the Covid bug that I've been able to elude finally caught up with me. Thankfully, my symptoms are significantly less than what many experienced at the arrival of this terrible virus back in 2019.

So while I'm locked up, I'm watching the trees in their wind-driven choreography. Trees are an amazing part of God's creation. They are incredibly strong and weather-tested!

Trees require relatively low maintenance because of their God-given resources (rain, soil & sun). It's easy to take them for granted until something happens, like a lightning strike or tornadic winds, and they have to be taken down. Trees don't just beautify the landscape but they provide shade for our homes and provide homes for the birds, squirrels and... leopards? We can thank PJ for that wonderfully terrifying imagery from his sermon on May 22 J.

Isaiah is given a beautiful message of hope to give to those who would be brought back from their exile into Babylon. The Exile was like an EF-5 tornado in the middle of Jerusalem (EF stands for the "Enhanced Fujita scale" named after it's developer, Ted Fujita). The people of God were weather-beaten, and depressed; needing hope to just stay alive. As you read this passage from Isaiah, note the uplifting message and ask yourself the question, who is the person speaking, is it Isaiah, or someone else?

[1] The Spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me,

because the LORD has anointed me

to bring good news to the poor;

he has sent me to bind up the brokenhearted,

to proclaim liberty to the captives,

and the opening of the prison to those who are bound;

[2] to proclaim the year of the LORD's favor,

and the day of vengeance of our God;

to comfort all who mourn;

[3] to grant to those who mourn in Zion—

to give them a beautiful headdress instead of ashes,

the oil of gladness instead of mourning,

the garment of praise instead of a faint spirit;

that they may be called oaks of righteousness,

the planting of the LORD, that he may be glorified. (Isaiah 61:1–3)

Just a few points to comment on:

This is the passage that Jesus read in the synagogue declaring, "Today this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing?" (Luke 4:21). Jesus is applying this reading to Himself. He is the One who has the anointing of the Holy Spirit. He is the Consolation of Israel.

This means that every deed that is accomplished in this passage, is done by Jesus of Nazareth, whom we now know as the very Son of God. So it is all about Jesus!

Jesus is the bringer of Good News,

Jesus is the One who binds up of the brokenhearted,

Jesus is the Proclaimer of liberty to the captives,

Jesus is the One who opens the prisons of those who are bound,


Jesus is the One who proclaims of the year of God's favor, and the day of vengeance of our God (Justice);

What Do You Have That You Have Not Received?

Some of the disciples of John the Baptist were questioning him about the baptism and preaching of Jesus. John the Baptist replies to their questions in this way: "A person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven" (John 3:27).

Now, John the Baptist says this to show that Jesus, His teaching, and His baptism are from heaven. But this statement is true of everything – everything that we have and are in body and soul. In fact, this is what we are taught in the meaning of the Apostles'

Creed in Luther's Small Catechism.

In the explanation of the Creed's First Article, we learn that God has made us and everything in the universe. Luther says:

"He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still takes care of them. He also gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all I have. He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life. He defends me against all danger and guards and protects me from all evil. All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me. For all this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him."

In the Second Article of the Creed, we learn that God sent His Son, Jesus, to humble Himself, taking the form of a servant. Luther writes:

"(Jesus) has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, that I may be His own and live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity."

In the Third Article of the Creed, we learn that the fruits of what Jesus Christ, the Son of God, did are given to us through the work of the Holy Spirit in the Church. Luther explains:

"That I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith. In the same way He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith. In this Christian church He dai-

ly and richly forgives all my sins and the sins of all believers. On the Last Day He will raise me and all the dead, and give eternal life to me and all believers in Christ."

Indeed, a person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven. But how easy is this for us to forget about this?

How easy is it for us to think that what we have in this life is because we have earned it? How easy is it for us to forget that even all our skills, the abilities of our hands and minds – the very ethic to work diligently and to seek to get better at these skills – is given to us from heaven, just as John the Baptist said? How easy is it for us to forget that it is Christ alone – and the work of the Holy Spirit – that reveals His salvation to us, delivers it to us, and not our doing?

Sure, we have responsibility for coming to church, for delving into God's Holy Word, and for praying without ceasing. But even these responsibilities are given to us from heaven, not to earn anything but in response to what He has accomplished for us.

A person cannot receive one thing unless it is given to him from heaven. Everything we have, and everything we are – in both body and soul – are gifts from God in heaven. Let us then respond in thanksgiving and give back to Him as He asks us to – with a first-fruits, generous proportion offering of what He has given to us. – LCMS Stewardship Ministry: lcms.org/stewardship

Hanging Out With Dad

I've always been a "daddy's girl." Growing up, I usually spent Saturdays in the garage with my dad. We'd build something, fix a car part or get into some trouble together.

Though Joseph wasn't Jesus' biological father, he certainly served as a father figure for God's Son. Jesus followed in Joseph's footsteps as a carpenter, but we're told little about his childhood. When Joseph advised Jesus to "measure twice and cut once," did Jesus mention he'd get it right on the first measure? How many craftsman tips did Jesus learn from Joseph? And did Joseph learn a few from Jesus? Surely young Jesus looked up to Joseph. What did wonder look like in the eyes of the One who invented wonder?

How am I hanging out with God on a regular basis? Am I continuing to learn his "trade"? Do I intentionally mimic his words, his kindness, his ways of loving others well? Take a minute to ponder that. Imagine yourself out in the garage with God (or in the kitchen with God, or at the computer with God). What task do you imagine doing together? What does God say to you as you look into



The Origin of Father's Day

One Sunday in 1909, Sonora Smart Dodd listened to a sermon honoring mothers. Her mother had died some years before, so her father had raised her by himself. Dodd wondered why there wasn't a day to honor fathers, so she arranged a tribute to her father at a church in Spokane, Washington. The date was June 19, 1910. Many people believe this was the beginning of Father's Day.

Another account holds that a West Virginia church held a tribute service for fathers in 1908, following a mine explosion that killed 360 men. Regardless of which story is correct, President Calvin Coolidge was the first president to designate a special day to honor fathers. In 1924, he proclaimed the third Sunday in June as Father's Day.



A Week of Tributes to Dad

To celebrate the special man in your life, use a quote a day the week before Father's Day, or honor him with tributes the whole week after. Write one of these (or one of your own) on a card, make a message into a placemat, tape one to the bathroom mirror — get creative! Every day of the week is a good day to celebrate his love and show him yours.

In this world of brokenhearted people, captive due to sin, it is Jesus alone who liberates us, declares God's favor over us, comforts us, beautifies us, and gladdens our hearts and fills our mouths with bold praise! Look no further than the carpenter of Nazareth to find this great consolation in the midst of our troubled world. This is not just information, but an invitation to find all these incredible blessings and benefits IN CHRIST.

The passage concludes with a purpose statement. It answers the question why does Jesus do all this for us?

The first purpose is "that they (Israel & us) may be called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the LORD." Christ calls His followers
Oaks of Righteousness. When God speaks, the Word is empowered
and accomplishes what it declares. By calling us Oaks of Righteousness, God has made us into strong, sturdy, storm-tested, beautiful trees. Their strength however, depends not on their own working
but on His Word. Like a strong tree, it is imperative that the tree receives the nutrients from the soil, the refreshing rain and the Light of
the world who through all these means brings nutrients through our
leaves to the core of our being. It is the Word of God that makes the
tree strong.

It is the ministry of Jesus through the proclamation of His Word that purposefully builds us, His people, into Oaks of Righteousness. His strength is poured into us and becomes our strength to weather any and every storm of life.

The final purpose of Christ's Oak strengthening work in us is to bring God Glory! The person (tree) who receives the ministry of Jesus receives everything he needs to become strong and beautiful. Have you noticed how people filled with the Spirit of God attract others to themselves. We are attracted to those whom God gives that peace that surpasses understanding. We are in awe of those whose life's storms would destroy us, yet they seem to gain new strength with every trial. That's why we're attracted to the early church fathers who forsook the world to gain Christ. Nothing else mattered. Their wood was tested under most extreme conditions yet they would not bend. We want that too!

To God's glory there is also an inner beauty that resides in a Christ-called Oak of Righteousness. They have a special glow, a never-ending countenance of gladness that is steady in spite of circumstances. This too comes from the Lord's enriching, nurturing power! Those who are suffering in this storm-ravaged world delight to be in the company of those with such joy and they want to know how to get it.

All of this redounds to the Glory of God! We are weak branches in the eyes of the world, brittle twigs; but by the mighty and powerful Word of God we stand tall and strong, as Oaks of Righteousness in the eyes of God.

Dear Blessed Savior Family, for this gift we must do nothing but ask. Even that desire comes from God. And when we receive this gift, we want nothing more than to show and share the strength we have received to help others in their weakened estate. God wants to use you and me to build a forest of Oaks, so that together we can stand against any storm of life. For this strength, for this beauty, for this joy... we give Glory to God. It makes me want to hug a tree! So when I give you a hug... just know this is what I'm thinking of you!

Glory be to God Alone!!

Faith In Action = EVANGELISM

Going the Second Mile

In Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, he teaches, "If anyone forces you to go one mile, go also the second mile" (Matthew 5:41, NRSV). Back then, Jews were subject to Roman rule and often compulsory service. Commoners could be forced to fetch water, carry baggage and perform other menial tasks. So Jesus suggests that rather than complying with gritted teeth and muttered curses, people offer to carry the pack a second mile as well.

These days, the second (or extra) mile denotes going beyond what's expected or required, whether in effort or kindness. In *Going the Second Mile*, Mel Blackaby describes the concept as "the difference between living as a good person and enjoying life as a child of God." He explains, "When you 'do your best' for someone, you go the first mile. When God does his best through you, you experience the second mile. This can happen only when you let Christ in you

take over and empower you to accomplish what is impossible by your natural abilities. While others see you on the first mile, they see Christ on the second."—adapted from *The Wired Word*

A Standup Guy

During the pandemic, a Maryland man used "dad jokes" to lift neighbors' spirits. Tom Schruben jotted down a joke-of-the-day on a curbside whiteboard. Hearing people chuckle and chat eased the isolation. Schruben and his wife, Ann, became intentional about seeking joy after two of their children died. They vowed to "find happiness again" and share it. For Father's Day last year, Schruben held a Bad Dad Joke contest, donating entry fees to a local charity. Here are a few of his favorites:

The Church Hive

Bees live in a cooperative way described as "eusociality," or good relations. Each bee contributes a specific skill to the colony, synchronizing its efforts for the benefit of all. Likewise, a church's health depends on all members fulfilling their responsibility to the organism as a whole. Descriptions of hive life mirror Paul's words about the body of Christ, with members having different gifts "but the same Spirit" (1 Corinthians 12:4).

According to R.S. Beal Jr., who was both a pastor and a zoology professor, a beehive is the perfect "living illustration of how to walk in unity." He wrote, "Those of us who have believed in Jesus belong to one another just as much as we belong to

Christ. We cannot live independently of one another anymore than we can live independently of Christ.
