




VBS 2023 June 5-9—5:30-8:30

Remember our 4G drive at the beginning of the year? Can you remember what the 4Gs represent? Here's a reminder:

Glorify – Gather – Give - Go!

How have we done in the area of Gathering? Well, we have weathered the Covid storm quite well. Not all have come back to worship in person, but we understand that some people still feel their health is too compromised to risk going out in public, especially when they gather with such an affectionate group like the people of BSLC! Our worship attendance has been slowly climbing. And our Fall Festival and Trivia events were also well supported. Could we do better? Sure! We have truly missed those who, for reasons we don't know or understand, have not returned to worshiping on a regular basis. Let us pray that the Lord will remove the obstacles that prevent some from Worship and Fellowship and give them peace in their hearts to return for the fellowship's sake. Together God can accomplish much through us!

How have we done in the realm of Giving? GREAT! I am overwhelmed how much stronger financially we have become since the Covid virus. Your offerings have not only strengthened our financial stability, but they have helped many people through agencies such as: St. Vincent de Paul, the O'Fallon Food Pantry, Lutheran World Relief, and others like them. Our VBS staff voted to donate this year's VBS Offerings to Pastor Daniel and his family. Pastor Daniel is staying in America to complete his doctorate at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. This may be a bit premature, but we may be supporting the next President of the Lutheran Church in Ghana. How blessed we have been to have him at Blessed Savior! Can we do more? Most assuredly! Remember that giving is more than putting a check in the offering plate. Sometimes giving time to someone who is home bound, taking them out for a meal or helping them to get some needed recreation is HUGE! And these things are happening. While going to a STL Cards, Blues or City Soccer game, ask the Lord to point out opportunities to give of some of your time and talents to help someone in need.

How have we done in regards to the Great Commission? I think we all would like to be better at reaching out to others with the Good News. Now remember, not everyone is called to be an Evangelist, but every Christian is a Witness! So don't beat yourself up if you've not taken control of a street corner to preach the Gospel to the people going by J. Witnessing is a relational activity. You build friendships and when the unchurched hear your reverence of Christ and your love for God's people, that's Evangelism! And the beauty is, you're not responsible for the outcome. That's the work of the Holy Spirit. And He will use your words and actions to draw the unchurched to Christ. So when you're out with friends and neighbors, pray for a willing spirit to let the light of Christ shine through your words and actions. Be humble and authentic. 

The Origin of Father's Day

One Sunday in 1909, Sonora Smart Dodd listened to a sermon honoring mothers. Her mother had died some years before, so her father had raised her by himself. Dodd wondered why there wasn't a day to honor fathers, so she arranged a tribute to her father at a church in Spokane, Washington. The date was June 19, 1910. Many people believe this was the beginning of Father's Day.

Another account holds that a West Virginia church held a tribute service for fathers in 1908, following a mine explosion that killed 360 men. Regardless of which story is correct, President Calvin Coolidge was the first president to designate a special day to honor fathers. In 1924, he proclaimed the third Sunday in June as Father's Day.





Just like Dad

At the beginning of his ministry career, Jerry Steen supplemented his income by mixing animal feed. When his two young boys greeted him at home, they laughed at his dusty appearance before he headed to the shower.

"I didn't think too much of this until I was washing my car and saw my older son doing something very strange," Steen recalls. "He was picking up the gravel and stones in our drive and rubbing them into his pants." Curious, the father asked what the boy was doing. "I want to be dusty like you, Dad!" his son replied.

For Steen, that was an eye-opener. "I realized that if a child would look up to his father for being dusty and want to copy his father," he says, "a child could look up to his father and follow him for anything." What traits and qualities are you modeling and passing on — to your own kids and to anyone else who looks up to you?

Now if you haven't read between the lines of this article, let me be clear. What St Paul said to the Church at Thessalonica I can hear myself saying to you.

Finally, then, brothers, we ask and urge you in the Lord Jesus, that as you received from us how you ought to walk and to please God, <u>just as you are doing</u>, <u>that you do so more and more</u>. (1 Thessalonians 4:1)

Paul recognized that this beloved church was already walking with God and doing things that were pleasing to Him. I see the same in the lives of our fellowship at Blessed Savior. But because of the huge challenge before us to "make disciples of all nations," St Paul is urging us to do those things **more and more.**

4G – Glorify, Gather, Give, Go! In 4 simple words we are reminded of the heart and core of our ministry at Blessed Savior. Christ loves you all and so do !! So while you're sitting beside the pool, hiking in the mountains, visiting the wonders of His creation, or just enjoying a "Sta-cation" around the house, know that our Lord is pleased with everything you do, big or small, to exalt Him and glorify His name. To increase the JOY of our Savior, let us strive to follow Him more and more. When we do, JOY comes not only to our Savior, but to those whom we serve and are being saved as a result!

What Do You Want?

One of the best-known and most-beloved STEWARDSHIP psalms is Psalm 23, the "Shepherd Psalm." There we learn that the Lord is our Shepherd. And since He is our Shepherd, we will not want. We will not suffer want because the Lord, our Shepherd, will lead us to green pas-

tures and beside still waters. In other words, the Lord, our Shepherd, will provide for all that we need in both body and soul.

Yet, we live as though this is not the case. We live as though we actually suffer from want, that the Lord, our Shepherd, will not provide for all that we need. And thus, we live as though the Lord is not our Shepherd. And that means that we live as though we are not the Lord's sheep. When do we live as though the Lord is not our Shepherd? When we put anything else before Him and His provision for us. When we think that going to work is more important than receiving His gifts in church on Sunday (in violation of the First and Third Commandments). When we fail to give generously of the first fruits of what the Lord has provided for us because we don't know what the future will bring (even though He has promised that He will lead us to green pastures and still waters). We live as though we are not the Lord's sheep when we think that the Lord is only in the business of helping those who will help themselves. We act this way because our minds are set on earthly, temporal things and not on heavenly, eternal things. We act this way because we have stopped hearing the call of our Shepherd, which comes through His Word.

Through the Word of God, the Shepherd calls us to Himself. Through the Word, the Holy Spirit gathers and enlightens us with His gifts. Through the Word, we are kept holy and nourished in the one true faith, the faith that follows our Shepherd wherever He leads us. He promises to lead us to our true home, to the land flowing with milk and honey, to a better country, not of this world, but a heavenly one.

And so, here's the Good News: the Lord is your Shepherd, even and es-

pecially for wayward sheep. For Jesus seeks and saves those who are lost. He finds the lost sheep and carries them back to the fold. He is the Shepherd who lays down His life for His sheep. The Lord is your Shepherd. Let us live as His sheep.






Turn Your Platform into an Altar

Keep Trying

In *The God Who Stays*, contemporary Christian musician Matthew West writes about the pandemic's fear-filled early days. After his concert tour was abruptly canceled in March 2020, he rode to an airport "feeling utterly hopeless about a world that was spinning out of control."

Then Arthur, his ride-share driver, began singing along to the radio — and the song happened to be West's "The God Who Stays." West joined in, jokingly asking how he sounded. "Not so good," Arthur replied, not knowing West's identity. "You keep trying."

The driver shared how those lyrics uplifted him during life's difficulties, and West later recalled that conversation during lockdown, while wondering where God was. The musician realized he had "settled for a socially distant relationship with the One who is nearer than I dare to believe, closer than the air I breathe." But West pictured "God running toward me with open arms like the prodigal's father," and he resolved to keep trying — and to grow closer to the God who always stays.

Living as Poetry of God

For Christians, the Scriptures are our first source of guidance for how to live, and within them, Jesus is primary. But God speaks through nonbiblical voices too: preachers and teachers not found in the Bible, and even literature that isn't directly Christian. God, who used King Cyrus of Persia to free the exiled Israelites. can use anyone to call us to right living. Take, for example, Walt Whitman's description of life as poetry when we live certain ways. and God as "the greatest poet":

"This is what you shall do: Love the earth and sun and the animals, despise riches, give alms to every one that asks, stand up for the [vulnerable], devote your income and labor to others, hate tyrants, argue not concerning God, have patience and indulgence toward the people, ... and your very flesh shall be a great poem and have the richest fluencv. ... The known universe has one complete lover and that is the greatest poet. ... His love above all love has leisure and expanse." (From the preface to Leaves of Grass, 1855)

Welcomed Back to the Fold



When her beloved dogs "returned home from an adventure smelling of eau de skunk parfum," Pastor Joanna Loucky-Ramsey refused to let them in the house. Instead, she cleaned and cared for them outside, slowly reintroducing them to "full participation in family life" once the stink eased.

"The odor left by the skunk could serve as a metaphor for our sin or for the sin others perpetrate against us," she writes. "As much as God loves us, he hates the sin that hides the lovely fragrance of the image of God within each of us. God

wants to welcome each of us into his family and into the heavenly home he has prepared for us, but we need to be 'deodorized' from the eau de sin parfum that would mar the entire experience of being in God's fragrant presence."

Loucky-Ramsey continues: "Just as our dogs needed our help to get rid of the smell of skunk, we need God's help to purge us from the offense of sin that permeates our nature and masks who God created us to be. That's what Jesus accomplished by his death and resurrection: to make us new and whole." — adapted from The Wired Word

An Abundance of Gifts

In 2022, people set some amazing Guinness World Records. A Nebraska man paddled more than 37 miles in a hollowed-out pumpkin boat. A Vermont teen wearing 4-inch heels walked more than 600 feet across a tightrope. And an Oregon man found and alphabetized all 26 letters in a can of alphabet soup in 2 minutes and 8.6 sec-



onds. (The toughest part, he says, is distinguishing subtle differences between letters such as M and W.)

Your talents might not earn you any world records, but they certainly can grow faith and change lives. Whether you're good at teaching, singing, writing, cooking or accounting, the church can put those skills to productive use. Romans 12 lists many more qualities you may not realize are spiritual gifts: graciousness, serving, generosity, acts of mercy, loving and honoring others, extending hospitality, rejoicing and weeping with people, making peace.

You might not be able to outperform the alphabet soup record. But God abundantly blesses each of us to "outdo one another in showing honor" (Romans 12:10, ESV) and in sharing his love. Stephanie Martin

America was founded as a "nation under God," and has been looked up to by other nations for over two hundred years. Unfortunately, other countries — and some of our own citizens — are disgruntled with America today. Even though our reputation has taken some hits, we're still a strong country with high ideals and proud people.

There's a simple way you can help show that to the world — by flying the flag. Every time you put a flag out, you're saying, "I'm an American and proud of what this flag represents." The flag stands for "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness," for religious freedom, and for other rights that many nations lack. The flag represents our history and our goals for a better future for all.

Since the early 1800s various groups have observed a day to display the American flag. Presidents Woodrow Wilson (in 1916) and Calvin Coolidge (in 1927) issued proclamations marking June 14 as National Flag Day. But it wasn't until August 3, 1949, that Congress approved June 14 as a day of national observance. President Harry Truman signed it into law.

The American flag has changed designs more than any other flag in the world. In fact, the United States didn't have a standardized flag until 1912! And even after standardization, the flag changed three more times with the addition of new stars representing new states.

Flag Day is celebrated each year on June 14. Fly your flag high!
