"Jesus of Nazareth ... went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him." Acts 10:38

What's all this talk of the devil? Actually, the theme of our fight against evil powers is covered in the texts for the Sundays of Lent. St. Luke summarized Jesus' work as "doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil..." Apparently, there were many in His day that were oppressed by the devil! Sometimes Jesus worked from dusk to dawn without a break. He entered our

world precisely to do battle against the powers of evil. When addressed by someone as "Good Teacher," he said, "Only God is good." What they didn't or couldn't see was that He was and is the perfect image of God in human form revealing to us the truth of God's goodness. This idea is worthy of our investigation.

I have noticed that a problem that has been spreading in our culture today. So many in our generation, even those who were raised in the Church have abandoned their faith because they believe that God alone is in control of the world, which then leads them to the conclusion that He alone is to blame for everything bad that happens. Think about it. Haven't we all said or at least thought to ourselves, "if God is good, why did He allow to happen?" You fill in the blank. Why did God allow the Covid virus, war, tragic car accidents, murders, cancer etc? We're so quick to lay blame upon God for the bad things and as a result refuse to give Him glory for the good things. Is that fair? That's the question.

The problem with that kind of thinking is that from the time of Adam and Eve, humankind –Invited, yes, invited the oppression we all experience in our lives. Yes, WE followed the lead of our ancient forefathers when Adam and Eve bought the lie of Satan in the Garden. What lie you ask? The lie that death would not result from listening to him and his suggestion that we're better off disregarding God's good and gracious will in order to make our own decisions and to become the captains of our own fate. But little did Adam and Eve know, and what we have forgotten is that we traded the freedom of God's goodness for bondage to the one who comes to "kill, steal and destroy." From the time of the fall in the garden, all of humankind followed the devil to a path that leads to death. And now that we see the consequences of that choice, the "bad" in our world, we blame God. How cleaver was the devil in his scheme to lead us out of our relationship with God and His goodness, so that he would have the freedom to exercise his power to oppress us, and then blame God for the results. NOT FAIR!!

Enter Jesus, the perfect image of our heavenly Father. You might think God would want to set the record straight before He accepted our self-imposed sentence of death. To say to us, "I told you so! But you wouldn't listen." That would be justified but Jesus came not just to set the record straight but to rescue us from our ill-conceived notions that we know better than He! That we can make goodness of our lives without Him. Out of pure goodness, the Lord came to do battle with, and overcome the forces of evil that oppress His creation. That battle led Him to a cross. There He fought and won the war against the devil, but at no small cost. On the cross He exchanged His sinless life for the lives of God's rebellious people, who abandoned Him and then blamed Him for the "bad" we endure today. Again, NOT FAIR, but Good! Good for us!

Lent is a time of sorrowful reflection upon our rebellion against God and the curse of death that fell upon us by our own grievous fault. That's bad! But God in His goodness executed a plan which even the devil couldn't see coming. Jesus would take our judgment upon Himself. He would die our death. He absorbed all the "bad" brought about at our invitation, and He died for it all. Why? Because only Jesus, true God and true man, could endure the wrath of God.

Good Friday wasn't a pretty day. It was bloody and cruel. But it was the day Jesus willingly accepted our penalty in order to give us a new status in life, that is righteous, and the hope of eternal GOODNESS! And when the debt was paid, they took Him down from the cross and put Him in a tomb. But that would not be His permanent resting place. Three days later He rose from the grave and appeared to more than 500 souls! And with His resurrection He assured His followers that His glorified body would also be their glorified body!! O, the Goodness of Jesus!

One of my favorite songs we have sung in church was written by the worship leaders of CityAlight, a ministry of St Paul's Castle Hill, part of the Anglican Diocese of Sydney, Australia. The song is entitled "The Goodness of Jesus." Sometime during this Lenten season, maybe after one of your devotion readings in the Red Letter Challenge, get on your computer and google the song. Lenten sorrow prepares us for the joy of our Lord's resurrection when we see the goodness of God restored to His beloved creation. Add to that the hope of glory we will have on the day of our resurrection, when all the bad we endure today will be put away forever.

Lenten Discipline: Denying the Self

We are at the beginning of Lent. During the Lenten season, the church calls to our attention the sufficiency of what God gives. It points to the sufficiency of God's grace in the atoning work of Jesus. It shows us the sufficiency **STEWARDSHIP** of faith in Jesus' work for us. It makes known the sufficiency of God's Word in faith and life.

> But Lent doesn't just remind us of the sufficiency of God's spiritual gifts the gifts that pertain to our redemption and salvation. Lent also reminds us of the sufficiency of the physical, temporal gifts of God which pertain to this body

and life. In other words, it reminds us of the importance of godly contentment and of outward discipline and training of the body.

This outward training of the body teaches us not to give in to every desire of our flesh, but to learn to say no to them. And it does this in such a way that if you fail, it is no sin. It is a way to practice without putting yourself into a compromising situation.

Fasting is a good example of this outward training. When you fast, you are practicing saying no to the desires of your body. But if you fail in this, if you break your fast, you have not sinned. But you have learned something about how your flesh works, how difficult it is to fight against it, and how you need help from above to discipline the desires of your body.

Another example is almsgiving. An increase in giving to the church and its mission during Lent is also a form of outward training. We all know that our flesh finds security in money and stuff. By committing to give more to the church, you are training your flesh. You are, by this outward discipline, training yourself to be content with what God gives. You are practicing saying "no" to your desires. Again, if you fail, you have not sinned. But you've learned just how powerful your flesh is — it leads you instead of you leading it. You've learned how you need help from above in being content with what God gives.

This is why St. Paul instructs young Pastor Timothy in this way:

But godliness with contentment is great gain, for we brought nothing into the world, and we cannot take anything out of the world. But if we have food and clothing, with these we will be content. But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs. (1 Tim. 6:6–10)

Our sufficiency is not of ourselves; it is in God. Let us learn this without sin by training our flesh this Lenten season. - LCMS Stewardship Ministry: lcms.org/stewardship


