

Dear Brothers and Sisters of Blessed Savior,

Sometimes I enjoy reading about heroes of the Lutheran Reformation. These folks aren't very well known, but God used them to change and impact many lives with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. True, these folks lived a long time ago. But their lives can still inspire us and demonstrate the power of God's grace in Christ.

One Reformation hero who really got my attention a few years ago is a man named George the Pious, the Margrave (ruler) of Brandenburg-Ansbach. George was born in Ansbach in 1484 to Margrave Frederick the Elder and his wife, Sophia. Although raised as a Roman Catholic, George was impressed by the teachings of Martin Luther, especially after he witnessed Luther's refusal to recant his writings at the Diet of Worms in 1521. You'll recall that after Luther was asked to take back his teachings, he replied, "I am bound by the Scriptures and my conscience has been taken captive by the Word of God, and I am neither able nor willing to recant, since it is neither safe nor right to act against conscience. Here I stand. I can do no other. God help me." George was also moved by the preaching of Lutheran pastors in the city of Nuremberg and Luther's translation of the New Testament in 1522. After meeting Luther in 1524 and corresponding with him, George became a devout Lutheran and worked tirelessly for the spread of the Gospel in the lands he ruled.



While George was impressed by Luther's courage at the Diet of Worms in 1521, he himself demonstrated great courage when he and other Lutheran princes met with Charles V, Emperor of the Holy Roman Empire, in Augsburg in 1530 to present their confession of faith. This confession is now called the Augsburg Confession and is a teaching standard for Lutherans and other Christians. At first the emperor refused to hear the confession or have any discussion about theological concerns. He commanded the princes to stop the Gospel preaching in the city. When George and Philip of Hesse stated that the Emperor couldn't dictate to their consciences, the Emperor became furious. According to Johannes Walter in his book *Der Reichstag zu Augsburg, 1530*, George stepped forward calmly, looked the Emperor in the eye, and said, "Before I would deny my God and His Gospel, I would rather kneel down here before Your Imperial Majesty and let you cut off my head."

The Emperor was shocked and stammered in broken German, "Not cut off head! Not cut off head!" A few days later, on June 25, 1530, the confession was presented and read to the Emperor. He wasn't happy, but the Lutheran princes survived their confrontation with him and left Augsburg having boldly confessed their reliance on Jesus for salvation and their adherence to God's Word.



Again, this all happened a long time ago, but it still speaks volumes to us today. It speaks to the need for Christ, the cost of discipleship and the power of the Holy Spirit when bearing witness to Jesus. God grant us courage like that of those Lutheran princes. A courage that says in the face of ridicule and anger at the Christian faith, "Jesus is my Savior! He is the way, the truth and the life, and I trust in him."

# **Honor Your Mother**

Anna Jarvis, the woman who first suggested a national day to honor mothers, had an incredible mother to honor. Her mom, Ann Reeves Jarvis (1832-1905), was a Sunday school teacher and activist who helped lower infant-mortality rates in Appalachia and promoted friendship among families of Civil War soldiers.

At a memorial service for her mother, Anna Jarvis distributed carnations — her mom's favorite flower — to attendees. Her idea to set apart one day each year for moms gained traction, and in 1914, President Wilson proclaimed the second Sunday of May Mother's Day. It was customary by then to wear white carnations in honor of departed mothers and red carnations to honor the living.

Of the white flowers, Jarvis said they "symbolize the truth, purity and broadcharity of mother love; its fragrance, her memory, and her prayers. The carnation does not drop its petals, but hugs them to its heart as it dies, and so, too,



#### Mother — and More

Though I've primarily known God as Father — along with metaphors such as rock, eagle, shepherd, potter — I also learned of Scripture passages portraying God as mother. For example (all NIV):

- "For a long time I have kept silent. ... But now, like a woman in childbirth, I cry out, I gasp and pant" (Isaiah 42:14).
- "As a mother comforts her child, so will I comfort you" (Isaiah 66:13).
- "Like a bear robbed of her cubs, I will attack them" (Hosea 13:8).

In others, God is pictured doing traditional "women's work": making clothes (Genesis 3:21), sweeping (Isaiah 14:23), preparing and hosting a meal (Proverbs 9:1-6), baking bread (Luke 13:21).

One of my favorite images of God is tucked in Hosea. While many modern dads nurture their toddlers this way, the tender words surely call to mind a mama's care: "It was I who taught [Israel] to walk. ... To them I was like one who lifts a little child to the cheek, and I bent down to feed them" (Hosea 11:3-4). Most importantly, God — however known — is loving and good. —Heidi Hyland Mann

#### In-carnation

The official flower of Mother's Day is the carnation, the favorite flower of the mom of the holiday's founder, Anna Jarvis. Over time, the custom arose of wearing a white carnation on Mother's Day if your mother has died and a red one if she's living.

In fact, many carnation colors have special meanings. Pink carries the richest Christian symbolism. According to legend, carnations first appeared on earth as Mary wept while watching Jesus carry his cross. Where her tears fell, there appeared pink carnations, symbolizing a mother's undying love.

According to one theory, the English word for carnation comes from *carnis*, Latin for flesh. From the same root comes *incarnation*, God's coming to earth in flesh. Thus, carnations remind us of our loving mothers as well as our loving Savior.

FROM THE PASTOR

Two thoughts are guiding my thinking as I am writing this newsletter article. The first thought is that November marks the end of the church year. This is most evident in the lessons which revolve around the themes of the End Times, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Coming of Christ and Judgment Day. The second thought is drawn toward what most of us think about in November: Thanksgiving Day.

The convergence of these two thoughts, "the end" as we know and live it and "thanksgiving," immediately drew my attention to Omar and His father. I met Omar (and his wife Sue) through the Drouin Family. Omar has been an active participant of our Friday Night Bible Study at the Drouin home. By all accounts he is a great neighbor, friend, and faithful member of a local church in O'Fallon.

Last Friday (from the time I wrote this) Omar told us that he had been transferring all his VHS tapes to DVDs. As he was previewing tapes he ran across a recording of his dad. It turned out that this tape was recorded in the last year of his dad's life.

Omar's dad, Manuel, had been suffering from cancer for some time. He knew his health was deteriorating and the end was near. At the young age of sixty-one, as he faced the certain end of his life, he talked about how full his life had been. He didn't talk about what he would miss by not being around the 20 or 30 more years of his entitled natural life expectancy. He was complete and content with the blessings God had given him. And He was thankful for it all. There it was; the intersection of "the end" and "thanksgiving"!

So many of us struggle with the convergence of these two ideas. Thankfulness depends on the continued flow of blessing. But when we see "the end" approaching (whatever "the end" looks like to us personally), "thankfulness" so often desists. How can one move into a mood of thankfulness when death threatens us? Isn't the real question we all have at these times: "Where is God when disaster comes?" If He is a loving God, would he allow me to suffer cancer? If He is a caring God, would He allow our lives to be threatened by raging fires, violent hurricanes, crunching earthquakes, and tsunamis? If he is a God of compassion, would He allow enemy terrorists to kill innocent human beings who are going about their daily activities just to provide shelter and provisions for their families? What was Omar's dad thinking? How can a person confronted with "the end" be content and "thankful" when they are "walking in the valley of the shadow of death?"

"The LORD is my shepherd, I shall not want;

There isn't a person among us who cannot attest to the Lord's physical and material blessings. If we're honest, like Omar's dad, we can see the fullness of his blessing in our lives materially, like our homes, our families, our friends, our town, our country, etc. But we have also been blessed spiritually having received a faith that trusts in the promises of our Lord Jesus Christ. The Psalmist draws our attention to our Shepherding Lord who promises to be with us as we walk through the valley of the shadow of death. He is preparing a feast for us in the presence of our enemies! His anointing is lavish, excessive, and He continues to be good and merciful even when the end comes. What is He doing? He is preparing a house for us, that the fires of this life, or even the fires of hell, will never touch. And there, we will live secure eternally. Jesus said, "And when I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am


We are in full swing planning for VBS. We have had several members volunteer to help out and Christian Ed thanks you. However, we still need help. We need to fill the following positions.



#### More Than a Negative

Even if you've never had to testify in court, a thousand TV shows have made you familiar with the question, "Do you

swear to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?" Why not just make people swear to tell the truth? Or make them promise not to lie?

Any parent who has ever had to interrogate a child about a broken cookie jar or a scuffle over a toy knows the answer. There are plenty of ways to try to get out of trouble without *technically* lying. You tell *just enough* of the truth to skate on by.

We often play the game of seeing *how close* we can get to sinning without *technically* going over the line.

But in our heart of hearts we know that this is not what God intended when He gave us the commandments. He's not giving us a merely negative rule and challenging us to just barely stay away from this or that. There is much more to each commandment than a prohibition. We shouldn't just avoid murdering people — we should be of service to our neighbor.

For each negative prohibition in the commandments there is a positive good that we are to cherish and protect. In the Eighth Commandment, that gift is the reputation of our neighbor and our relationship with him:

You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.

Your relationship with your family members (who are your nearest neighbors), the other members of your congregation, your coworkers and your friends is one of the most precious gifts you have been given. You need to exercise good stewardship with this gift just as much as you need to exercise good stewardship with your life, resources, time and income. This is an especially fragile gift because it's easy to ruin a relationship with slander and talking behind someone's back.

But speaking well of your neighbor in Christian love is absolutely free; it costs you nothing, yet it pays you great dividends. If you find this challenging at times, if you are tempted to speak ill of others, just remember that this other person is also a beloved child of God for whom your Lord Jesus suffered and died. Your Lord Jesus loves you both.



#### Life Immortal

At the end of May, Americans honor those who've died for our country — and remember all deceased loved ones. These times of reflection, often in cemeteries, can make us ponder our own mortality. Even some Christians may fear the unknown of death.

Yet because of our faith, followers of Jesus can aim to make productive use of whatever earthly time we have left. We know the grave isn't the end. Consider this poetic description of life everlasting from Henry Wadsworth Longfellow: "Dust thou art, to dust returnest / was not spoken of the soul."

To our deathdefying, deathdefeating God we pray: Eternal God, empower us to take hold of the eternal life to which Christ calls us, and to boldly testify of it to anyone who asks the reason for our hope. To the immortal King of the ages, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel, to him be honor, glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen.

#### **Council Meeting 9 April 2024**

# a fun Flower Frog

A flower frog sits atop a vase to help arrange flowers and hold stems in place. This personalized frog will become a favorite!

#### What you need:

- Air-dry clay
- Roller
- Vase (or jar)
- · Plastic knife
- Straw
- Acrylic paint and brushes



#### What you do:

- Roll out a portion of clay to about ½-inch thickness.
- Cut out a circle that's slightly larger than the vase opening. (This will allow the finished frog to sit securely on top.)
- To make holes for stems, use a straw to punch out circle shapes. If you make more than one frog, try arranging the holes in different patterns.
- Let dry completely. Then personalize your work with acrylic paint.
- When dry, place the frog atop the vase.
   Arrange flowers and greenery to make a Mother's Day bouquet.





For Pentecost, make a thaumatrope, a spinning toy that creates an optical illusion of motion.

### What you need:

- White paper
- Cup
- Scissors
- Pencil and markers
- Plastic drinking straw
- Glue

# What you do:

- Using the cup's circular shape, trace two identical circles on the paper.
   Carefully cut them out.
- In pencil, draw a person's head on one circle. Then place the blank circle on top and use the image beneath to guide you in drawing a flame above the head.
- Color the two images with markers.
- Apply glue to the backs of the circles and sandwich the top of the straw between them so it looks like a lollipop. Let dry.
- Roll the straw quickly between your hands to view a mini motion picture.



# A heartfelt felt heart

On Mother's Day, express your love for your mom or another special woman by giving her this gift from the heart.

#### What you need:

- Red felt (8" x 11" sheet)
- Dark pen
- Fabric scissors
- Pillow stuffing
- Straight pins
- Embroidery thread (pink, red or black)

- 1. Fold the felt in half and draw a heart on it. Cut out the heart so you have two of the same size.
- 2. Place the hearts on top of each other, add stuffing and pin the hearts together.
