



Vacancy Pastor Update – Pastor Perry

Things seem to keep changing with what I see as my role in the congregation during this vacancy, which hopefully will be short-lived in the near future (our vacancy). One of my favorite verses is Psalm 31:5: "My times are in Your hand…" Indeed, they are! We plan one thing and then do another. We think we have something figured out and then something else happens. I'm talking about my role as "Vacancy Pastor" as spelled out in last month's newsletter and shared with the boards of the congregation. I said:

"I will no longer be scheduling the pastors who conduct worship services" and "My vacancy work will only be that of Visitation Pastor."

Well, I recant, sort of. I know that's not a popular concept and not one that our Lutheran heritage is based on, when Martin Luther refused to recant of his beliefs when brought before the Catholic tribunal. And yet, I have a good example from your other vacancy pastor, Tony Troup, who also recanted of his plan not to teach 7-8th Grade Confirmation Class, beginning this new school year. (Praise God!) So, what am I talking about?

I am once again involved with scheduling pastors to lead worship here; actually, finding new_pastors to lead worship here. I owe a debt of gratitude to Pastor Peter Kirby from the Missouri District office of the LCMS for his assistance with this mission. The reason that I have become involved with this aspect of scheduling (I told someone, "I'm being Nancy's secretary") is that we have had a couple pastors who will soon stop leading worship during our vacancy: Pastor David Pelsue and myself. Pastor Pelsue has accepted a vacancy at the Ironton parish in Illinois. And, due to a family conflict (Oct. 12) and Diane's health problems, I have decided to find someone else to take my place in the worship rotation here. I want to be more available to Diane for her health needs, including blood transfusions and iron infusions, which she is currently receiving about every 2 weeks. Between Diane's treatments she is fine and we go shopping for walking exercise some afternoons. Enough about that!

Information about our "new" pastors in the rotation for as long as the vacancy lasts will be in this newsletter and the next as well as the church bulletins. I will continue taking care of various jobs around the church as picking up the mail and checking emails. I will continue following up on visitors and those who join the congregation. I will also continue with calling on the sick, shut-in, and others with special needs as those visits allow me more flexibility. And, of course, you will all be in my prayers for God's guidance, strength, and other blessings. Meanwhile, we keep in mind regarding our vacancy and our personal well-being: "My times are in Your hand..." May God give us all faith to persevere through this vacancy and our problems.

The Sounds of Worship


Have you ever paused to listen — really listen — to the world around you?

Harmonious Stewardship

"For as in one body we have many members, and the members do not all have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another" (Romans 12:4-5).

One of the most forgotten concepts in stewardship is the interdependent nature that makes up the Body of Christ and the way that body supports the shared work of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This is experienced in the local congregation, as well as in broader mission and ministry efforts at the district and Synod levels. Yet in these words, St. Paul reminds the Romans and us that we are indeed

members of one another. This is true in our worship. It is also true in our stewardship of the Gospel. Stewards of all shapes and sizes, ages and abilities, affluence and influence are all assembled around Word and Sacrament in the local congregation with no one being more important than the other.

Part of this forgetting lies in what the eyes see and how our human mind operates. Our eyes and our minds are quick to come to the erroneous conclusion that the person who writes the biggest check is the more important steward. Human logic, flawed by sin as it is, could make a claim that the youngest child or the most infirm, aged member of the congregation would certainly be considered something less than important when it comes to the stewardship of the Gospel.

Paul makes it clear in these words that this is not how stewardship of the Gospel is measured in the Body of Christ. Rather, it would be better to view local stewardship like the lost art of harmony in congregational singing. This has been lost not only due to the performative nature of the lead singers of the local praise team, but also because modern hymnals are written to almost force the novice hymn-singer into unison voice. Creative harmonization by talented organists is beautiful to listen to, but does not always support the people in the pews in singing in parts. This is a loss in demonstrating a very practical aspect of whole-body stewardship.

The sound that builds when choral and congregational singers settle into their voice parts is nothing short of heavenly! Yet when altos, tenors and bass sing their individual parts without any concept of how they fit together, the music doesn't sound as powerful. The narrow range of the typical alto line almost sounds monotonous. The tenor line can get painfully high, and the base line can get uncomfortably low. But, when interdependently entwined, along with the melody that is so often carried by the sopranos, the music becomes a tremendously powerful tool in communicating the Gospel.

The same is true of individual stewards. Certainly, stewards with more financial means are in a unique place to "carry the tune" for ministry in a local congregation. But that doesn't rule out the faithful stewardship of the saint-like 94-year-old Hulda, who prayed for her young pastor in German every night while the aches and pains of arthritis and the grief of losing a daughter to cancer kept her awake. This does not rule out Jimmy, the profoundly developmentally disabled confirmand whose basic but dramatically eloquent confession of the faith left an impression on a congregation long after he went to be with Jesus. It doesn't rule out the single parent, the recovering addict, the family coming out of bankruptcy, the elderly widow and everyone in between.

The Lord has entrusted all the baptized with stewardship of the one thing needful: the Gospel of Jesus Christ. No one member of any congregation is more important than another when it comes to this stewardship. The biggest check isn't always the best way to communicate the Gospel. In fact, it is almost always better communicated with the widow's mite, the tenacious stewardship of the talents and so much more.

In the local congregation and beyond, our corporate stewardship of the Gospel needs each other to fill out our great confession. It is not about equal amount. It is about interdependence that only the Holy Spirit can work! Each of us has a role to play, a harmony to sing. The standard for that role is faithfulness. We do not have the same function, but we have the same Jesus! As we sing the parts entrusted to us by the Holy Spirit, the sweet music of the Gospel goes out!









So you can see BSLC is playing to win--disciples for Christ that is! Let's keep supporting team BSLC!




Make decorative stones as reminders of God's many great attributes.

- · Flat, smooth stones

- Paintbrush
- · Clear-drying craft glue
- Scissors
- · Permanent marker

What you do:


- Unfold the napkin, carefully separating the printed side from the solid side.

- Repeat with more stones. Use them as gifts, paperweights, table decorations, etc.


Create adorable sheep using graham crackers, marshmallows, and a little imagination!
